THEY'RE BAAACK! If you haven't noticed by now, those pesky Aedes aegypti, aka the anklebiters, have returned. Not that they ever left. The recent heavy rains and higher than usual humidity ushered in by Hurricane Hilary have

led to an uptick, so to speak, of these thirsty bloodsuckers that can spread the West Nile virus and other diseases.

"They are pretty sneaky," says Orange County Mosequito and Vector Control District spokesman Brian Brannon. "The ankle biters are the ones really bugging people the most — they'll bite you five or six times... they are day biters, whereas house mosquitoes will bite at dawn and dusk."

Here are some ways you can control their numbers in your yard, as well as on your skin:

• Search your yard weekly for anything that can hold a quarter inch of water and dump it. For example: plant saucers, tarps, buckets, trashcan lids.



- Empty bird baths weekly.
- Stock ponds with mosquito fish, apply larvicide or filter the water.
- Clean gutters.

- Rinse out pet water bowls weekly.
- Empty the toilet bowl brush holder.
- Flush unused toilets weekly.
- Use repellent on clothes and exposed skin.
- Wear long sleeves and light, loose-fitting clothes while outdoors.

FRUIT THIEVES: Another sort of pest, says some Spring Knolls homeowners, is the occasional resident who thinks it's OK to take ripened fruit from trees without permission.

"I have an orange tree and a lemon tree in the side yard--outside my fence," one homeowner lamented. "Last year, someone came by and stripped my trees, and I'm sure that I'm not the only one who has experienced this. This is not in any way acceptable."

Some residents, asked about such theft, say that some past owners, who no longer cared about the fruit, encouraged fellow residents to help harvest them. The best advice? If you see a fruit laden tree, ask the owner (new or old) if it's OK — or still OK — to pick some fruit.

Help yourself, your family stay safe by using 'simple steps' to prevent wildfires

Every year California faces unpredictable and devastating wildfires. As a retired Fire Battalion Chief and firefighter in California for 35 years, I've experienced firsthand the dangerous and life-altering effects a fire can have on families and businesses.

About 95 percent of California wildfires are caused by human activity. But there are some simple precautions we can take to prevent fires:

- Avoid using power equipment after 10 a.m. or on hot or windy days.
- Stay current on regular maintenance of your vehicle, do not drive onto dry grass or brush and make sure trailer chains and cables are not dragging on the ground.
- Never leave a fire unattended and follow all local guidelines for campfire, debris burning and fireworks.
- Practice safety and find out best practices when target shooting, including find-

ing the right ammunition type and using safe targets.

- Dispose of matches and cigarette butts in a closed container or cup of water.
- Maintain at least 100 feet of defensible space around your home and remove debris from gutters.
- If you see a downed power line, keep at a safe distance and immediately call 911,
- Most importantly, make sure you have an evacuation plan for you and your family if you get an evacuation order due to a fire or other emergency, and leave the area immediately to stay safe and to clear the way for emergency personnel.

Signing up for CALFIRE's incident updates will provide emergency information. They also have resources to help plan evacuations.
